Ring Around the Rosy»

Coordinate all your tableware by making this pair of rosy napkin rings. We began with bare wooden bangle bracelets (available in the Jewelry Dept.). We used floral cutters to remove the heads from mini-roses, and used hot glue to secure them directly to the wood bangle.



Corner Garden»

Our everyday tablecloth got a quick upgrade with the addition of some well-placed miniature roses. They were easily attached with a few dabs of hot glue. These pretty little blossoms can add texture, interest, and flowery appeal to a whole houseful of ordinary textiles, including bedding, curtains, even rugs.

« Have Your Cake And...

This flowery confection looks good enough to eat, but it's actually made from foam disks and rose blossoms. To make your own rose cake, stack 4-5 disks (a little styrofoam adhesive will hold them together), cutting out a wedge-shaped slice as shown. Then, use floral cutters to snip blossoms from our delicate mini-rose bushes and secure them to foam with low-temperature hot glue.



« Flair and Square

This project is all about simple pleasures.

It features lush pink roses and hydrangea
blossoms in an elegant square vase. Tufts of
prairie grass inside the vase add just the right
amount of visual interest and texture. Beautiful
and simple in it's design, the garden-inspired
arrangement needs little else.





Sweetness and Light»

This lamp is anything but "garden variety."
It acquired its decadent rosy shade with very little effort. To make it, we clipped the blossoms from beautiful miniature rosebushes. Then, we simply hot-glued the flowers to the lamp's existing shade, keeping placement tight and random.





You've heard of the language of flowers. Speak your mind with a garden of original alphabet art. To get this look, cover unfinished wooden letters with pretty, coordinating scrapbook papers and finished edges with ribbon. Then use hot glue to attach clusters of mini-roses and ribbon bows to each letter...we even chose to completely cover one letter top-to-bottom (like our letter 'E') with roses galore!



« Rose and Shine

We took a rosy approach to dressing up this chandalier. Begin by making a floral garland of white rose blossoms strung on clear thread. Then, add a handmade rose pomander (foam sphere, rose blossoms, and a tassel) to bottom of chandelier. Finally, hot-glue berry sprays to complete the bright and rosy design.



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
